A Magic Box by Jean Rousseau, President of Emmaus International

he Emmaus groups who take this magic box — the container — seriously know that the potential it contains is enormous. Through their work collecting unwanted second-hand goods they are well aware that, in rich countries, the quantity of collections reflects the excesses of consumer society and is, in other words, considerable.

After all, since the very beginning of Emmaus have we not always had a vocation to make the most of what is given to us and, above all, to share it? Sending containers is one of the key ways of sharing between those who have everything and those who have nothing and whose plight is unlikely to improve. So all it takes to share is simply, but properly, to fill that container and send it off!



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Participating in the Container Programme means getting involved in the international dimension of Emmaus with a view to sharing goods with the members of the Emmaus Movement who are most in need. But how does it work and what exactly is a container? Here is the journey taken by one of these magic boxes.

the real world, we know who we are sending the container to and what they need." Despite their limited material resources, the Angoulême community embarked on this adventure 5 years go by joining forces with other French groups from the same region. Together they collect all the necessary material and send 2 containers each year.

But what exactly is a container?

We are talking about a 66m³ shipping container which will be transported by lorry to a shipping port from where it will travel to Africa or Latin America. Sending a container is a way to provide goods and equipment to Emmaus communities in countries where everything is in short supply. The goods make it possible for the recipient group to develop and reinforce its activities and its own solidarity initiatives.

Once the destination has been identified (via the Container Programme) and the shipping date set, work can get underway: selecting and collecting goods in accordance with the instructions given by the recipient group, contacting a shipping agent, seeing to the administrative formalities, and loading and then shipping the container. On arrival the recipient group takes care of clearing the container through customs and making use

of the goods to put them on sale. What are the golden rules for a few containers and, although a lot of work goes into it, this is The container for Burkina Faso soon fills up. Prepare a container Whether alone, by joining forces with others or by contributing to the International Container Fund, you can make a difference! The 2010-2011 Container Programme, which groups together all the requests made, is available from the International Secretariat of Emmaus.

Recipient groups are chosen after consultation with the regions in order to find out their priorities. Even groups with limited resources can participate by making a financial contribution to the International Container Fund. This fund is used to cover the cost of shipping containers from sender groups that cannot afford to



sharing among groups worldwide, and even within groups. It is a great way to motivate companions and inspire them to get involved in international solidarity initiatives. Feedback about the projects pursued thanks to the container is much appreciated by the sender group and the International Secretariat of Emmaus is currently working on this information feedback system which can always be improved upon. For Bernard, sending containers is about solidarity principles: "We belong to an international movement, this affects all of us." For Christian, a companion at Angoulême, it is about aiming higher: "It's good to help people and to know that our work can be of use elsewhere, to help others in need." In the 2009-2010 period 47 containers were sent out of 95 requested by the Africa and America regions. 🛑

The Association des Femmes Amies or AFA group in Benin, which has been a member of Emmaus International since 2004, develops nnovative projects that would not be possible if they did not receive containers as Justine Michayi, the president of the organisation, explains:

What activities are carried out by your organisation? Our economic activity is the sale of second-hand goods. This allows us to fund a programme to provide assistance to children who work and live in Cotonou market. They learn French, singing and dancing and benefit from medical checkups as well as being made aware of children's rights. In our vocational training workshops they learn trades such as hairdressing and dressmaking. We also run programmes to promote women's rights and provide microcredit. Over 200 women are able to earn a living in the markets thanks to our support. Recently we have also been developing livestock and arable farming projects. There are 11 women working for the organisation to coordinate all these activities.

Why request containers? do so, to pay for companions to travel to the other community to participate in the preparation or unloading of the container or to deal with exceptional situations (such as customs clearance costs).

Request a container To receive a container all you need to do is to submit an application to your region at Regional Council meetings. This application will then be passed on to the World Council on Political Action and International Solidarity, made up of elected representatives from all over the world. The World Council decides whether or not to back the application and final approval is granted by the Board. It is important to supply a list of goods required and information about the projects planned with the goods received or the funds raised from the sale of those goods.

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What happens when the container arrives? The process of receiving a container occupies us for about a month. We are lucky in Benin because we don't have any customs problems. resources by creating jobs. The goods we receive are sold or we started receiving containers in 2006 we have never had china, clothes, domestic appliances, furniture and so on.
